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#### EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Amani Initiative is a Ugandan registered Non-Governmental Organization founded in 2011 in Maracha District to prevent and respond to harmful practices and barriers against children and women through low cost- high impact community led solutions with a current mandate to operate across Uganda. Our thematic areas include; (1) Education, (2) Child Protection and Safeguarding, (3) Child, Adolescent and Maternal Health, and (4) Socioeconomic Empowerment.

Amani Initiative is currently implementing a 5-years theory of change with a vision of creating a Ugandan Society where every child and woman is able to live with dignity and reach their full potential and mission of preventing and responding to harmful practices and barriers against children and women through low cost-high impact community led solutions.

Between 1<sup>st</sup> April- 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2022; Amani Initiative implemented 6 projects across Maracha District, Yumbe, Nakasongola, Mpigi, Kampala, Arua City, Arua District and Wakiso District highlighted as below: -

1. The West Nile HIV Project which aims to attain and sustain HIV epidemic control in the West Nile region of Uganda through optimization of high impact interventions to achieve UNAIDS 95:95:95 targets; and strengthening national, regional, district level capacities to meet MoH minimum performance.

The project is implemented in Maracha District with support from CDC and the Infectious Disease Institute across 12 health facilities with activities implemented as below: -

- I. Community Index testing.
- II. Follow up clients lost in care.
- III. Home based care for Non-suppressed.
- IV. Testing of Men 25 year and above.
- V. Community Facility linkages.
- VI. Follow up of mothers to complete the EID cascade.
- VII. TB Screening
- 2. The Right2Grow project whose ultimate goal is for every child to be able to reach their full potential through ensuring that all children under 5 are well nourished (aligned to SDG 2.2) and there is access to WASH services and it is majorly an advocacy project and aims at strengthening communities, civil society, government and development partners to support and/or advocate for an enabling environment to tackle stunting reduction for children under 5 in Uganda. The project is being implemented by Amani Initiative in Maracha district (Yivu and Oluffe Sub-counties), Arua District (Vurra Sub-County) and Arua City as a sub-grant from the Hunger Project and the Movement for Community Led Development Uganda Chapter under the Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs. During this reporting period two activities were implemented which include;
  - I. The annual essay competitions for boys and girls in P.6 and P.7
  - II. WASH and child feeding competition in the targeted districts of Maracha and Arua
- III. Orientation of TOTs on IYCF for Men and Feeding Demonstrations for Mothers, Infants and Children Feeding below 2 years in Maracha District
- 3. The Amplified Community Action against Teenage Pregnancy and Child Marriage project funded by Capital for Good through Girls First Fund and aims at, Ending child marriage and teenage pregnancy for prosperity and social economic transformation in Maracha and Arna districts. The project period runs from June 2020 to June 2022 and implemented within Kijomoro, Oleba and Oluffe Sub-Counties in Maracha District, Arua City and Vurra Sub-County in Arua District.

The activities carried out in the second quarter that is from April to June of 2022 included;

I. School fees support to at risk girls.

- II. Organizing Parents Teacher Meetings (PTA) on parenting in the face of Covid-19 and beyond.
- III. Installation of school talking compounds
- IV. Girls First Fund technical support visit
- 4. The School Financial Health Project supported by Edify with a goal to improve learning outcomes and access to affordable education through supporting low cost private schools improve aspects of school financial management. Follow up visits were conducted in a total of 180 schools across in Mpigi and Wakiso, and ongoing in Nakasongola.
- 5. Amani Initiative staff were invited to support trainings on Value Based Education (VBE) Project under the Foundations for Learning Project and Grassroots Soccer (GRS) by Aga Khan and PeaceCorps Uganda respectively. The VBE trainings directly supported 10 government schools within Arua City and Yumbe District reaching out to 135 members of the Senior Management Committee and 90 teachers. 28 participants across the Country participated in the GRS Coaches training facilitated by one of the Amani Initiative GRS Certified Coaches.
- 6. The organization also invested and provided capacity building opportunities for staff through training, workshops and meeting during the period from 1<sup>st</sup> April- 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2022. 5 capacity building sessions were availed for staff through which 10 staffs received capacity building.

Activity 1:-Community Index testing.	We were able to reach 28 clients of the 30 targeted in the quarter with 47 people tested, and 5 positives registered who all got linked to care.	This was possible due to proper targeting of people for the tests and the commitment of the Linkage Referral assistants in conducting the activity
Activity 2:-Follow up clients lost in care	The activities target of 360 lost clients to be followed was surpassed as we were able to follow up to 408 clients both TB and HIV.	This was possible because of the commitment of the Linkage Referral Assistants together with the IDI Koboko team, VHTs, local council one chairpersons and other stakeholders in identifying the lost clients, and the timely follow ups made, though 23 clients were found to have self-transferred, one refused to resume care and four (4) clients
Activity 3:-Home based care for Non-suppressed clients.	This activity's target of counselling services for 30 non-suppressed clients for the quarter was surpassed by ten to 40 clients.	were found to have died.  Five of the clients who were bled got suppressed viral loads, and this was because of the timely beginning of the activity and commitment of the Linkage Referral Assistants in identifying clients with nonsuppressed viral loads, and maintaining consistency in the sessions, though some clients disappointed us by dodging some counselling sessions which affected the consistency of the activity, and some results remained pending up to the time of reporting.
Activity 4:-Testing of Men 25years and above.	This activity's performance was fairly okay as we were able to screen up to 349 people of the 360 targets for the quarter, and 86 of the screened were tested for HIV with six positives registered and linked to care.	This was possible due to the collaboration of the Linkage Referral Assistants and the VHTs in targeting and identification of men for HIV testing.
Activity 5:-Community – Facility linkages	This activity's performance was good as we were able to surpass the quarter's target of 330 by 17.	This was possible due to LRAs good collaboration with the VHTs and Local council one chairpersons in identifying community members who needed the above services.

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Activity 6:-TB Screening	This activity's performance was good as we were able to screen 306 people which is more by 6 of the quarters target of 300, collected sputum from 99 of the screened, and 15 positives were registered and all linked to care. - To equip the participants with the necessary knowledge and skills in demonstrating to mothers and child care providers on preparation of nutritious weaning and complementary diets for children under 2 years of age.
- To equip participants with skills and knowledge in monitoring and provision of community growth monitoring, promotion services and growth promotion counselling.
- To generate a plan of action for continued food demonstrations and infant and young child feeding activities in the community, among the men and pregnant and lactating mothers.
- To establish a structure and mechanisms for implementation and coordination of continued food demonstration and IYCF orientation sessions for men in the community.
- To assess the magnitude and nature of gaps in child weighing equipment for VHTs in the community.

#### **ACHIEVEMENTS**

- o 6 projects supported across 6 districts of Uganda (Maracha, Arua City, Arua District, Yumbe, Nakasongola, and Wakiso)
- o 17 activities implemented directly contributing to the organization thematic areas of education, child protection and safeguarding, child, adolescent and maternal health and socioeconomic empowerment.
- o Followed up and provided technical support on school financial health management to 967 low cost private schools under the school financial health project.
- o The targets for activities planned under the West Nile HIV project were greatly achieved
- o 16 talking compound with messages of prevention and response on child abuse were installed in 16 schools
- o 04 sign posts for young mothers' groups were installed in 04 sub counties
- o Girls First Fund awarded for us a 2 years project to be implemented in Arua and Maracha districts
- o 15 community sensitization meetings on WASH, was held for both Maracha and Arua
- Over 600 learners and their teachers across 20 primary schools (learners in 11 different schools in Maracha, 5 schools in Wakiso and 4 under Arua including teachers) consulted and engaged in competition to assess knowledge and sensitize communities in aspects around water, sanitation, hygiene and nutrition.
- o 278 pupils 142 females and 136 males both in Arua and Maracha) empowered with information about Water. Sanitation and Hygiene

#### **CHALLENGES**

- o Limited funding sources to support implementation of activities
- O Some schools closed or had participants who attended the BAFF trainings leaving the schools making it hard to re-start the re-orientation process for BAFF.
- O Delay to complete award ceremony on time due to temporary send off of pupils to homes due to teachers sit down strike

#### RECCOMENDATIONS

- o Boys should be adequately involved in our programing
- o There is need for continuous mentorship of all the Linkage Referral Assistant in the areas of HIV testing, TB screening and testing, and general documentation in the ART clinic
- o Need for frequent support supervision both physical and phone calls
- o More knowledge should be passed to communities to ensure WASH is a priority since healthy body leads to healthy minds
- o More knowledge should be passed to mothers and their husbands on child feeding, WASH and Family planning
